## NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT

Spring is finally here. The weather is getting warm, the grass is turning green, and Danish Day is close at hand!

As we often do, we look to make regular improvements to our property, and the building committee has been very active during the past month. We are currently in the process of getting bids and making plans for some welcome improvements to the first floor. Preliminary plans include a reconfiguration of the guest suite on the first floor. This will allow us to add two additional new public bathrooms in close proximity to the Kaffestue. We will also be installing a new entry control system to the main entrance of the Atrium. This new system will feature a keypad and a door lock with remote accessibility. It is imperative that we keep our property secure, and this new system will allow us to grant access to our groups and guests, and keep the building safe when there are fewer people on the property.

The exterior of our building is benefiting from improvements as well. Thanks to a generous donation of time and funds

from the Jensen family, our landscaping is getting nicely refreshed, with special focus on the east and south side of the property. We will also be installing a new irrigation system to keep the grounds looking lush. We are hoping to get all of these property improvement projects completed by the end of this summer.

Final plans for Danish Day are coming together nicely. Our food and activity committees are working together to prepare for our annual celebration! We took a survey of members and volunteers after last year's event, and we are using the feedback to make this year's event better. We are reconfiguring the food stand locations in an effort to improve foot traffic flow, and we are making some other small changes as well. The goal is to make the celebration fun and enjoyable, and I am grateful for all of our volunteers who are working behind the scenes to make it happen!

## NJÁL'S SAGA TAPESTRY EXHIBITION

August 15-19

DAC and Icelandic

Hekla Club will be

exhibiting a traveling

version of The Njál Saga Tapestry modeled after the Bayeux Tapestry, a Viking-themed tapestry from Northern France that tells the story of the Norman Invasion of Britain in 1066. Like the Bayeux "Tapestry," the Njál's Saga Tapestry is not truly a tapestry, since tapestries are woven on looms. The Njál's Saga Tapestry is a long embroidery, entirely hand-stitched in the Bayeux-style on pure woven linen, using Icelandic wool, hand dyed with local plants. The Njál's Saga Tapestry recounts a local story of 10th and 11th century embattled Vikings, created and embroidered in the heart of Njál's Saga country, on the Rang River plain, in the town of Hvolsvöllur, South Iceland. Njál's Saga, or more accurately, The Saga of the Burning of Njál, is considered Iceland's mightiest saga. Its story and characters are woven into the fabric of Icelandic culture and the saga is read every year, on the same day, from start to finish in the schools and libraries of Iceland.

Save the dates for this special opportunity to see the tapestry, hear lectures and participate in embroidery workshops. Details will be announced on the DAC website as they develop this summer.

## THE DANEBO READING CIRCLE ENCOUNTERS PRINCE IN MAY – NOT THE PURPLE ONE

Sunday, May 18: 2-4pm:

All are invited to join the group in discussing Danish author Ib Michael's novel *Prince*, (DK: *Prins*, Copenhagen: Gyldendal, 1997, 208 pages; translated by Barbara Haveland, New York: Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 1999), available at a library, bookstore, or online. Michael has written several award-winning novels and this is the first of his to be translated into English. He is described as one of Denmark's foremost writers and lives in Copenhagen; he turned 80 in January. His style is described as magical realism. Kirkus Reviews recommended this book to readers who like Peter Høeg's novels and Isak Dinesen's gothic tales.

The May discussion leader, Carol Sime, begins her approach to the book with this observation: "To be let loose in the wonderland of childhood—that is what it means to be born a prince." She continues: What could be more enchanting than the world of a 12-year-old boy, free from parental strictures, spending a summer at a seaside hotel? Here he can explore nature with a secret playmate who takes different magical forms. Over the summer he grows in understanding of the world of adults. He learns to read, watches a lovelorn friend with a broken heart, and witnesses encounters with death. Various characters include a sea captain's ghost, a lighthouse keeper, a

possible scam artist, and a young girl with mutism. His exploits may remind readers of a Hans Christian Andersen fantasy or a Robert Louis Stevenson adventure." From Donna Rifkind's review in the *Baltimore Sun*: "Evocative... Michael's book has a lovely, tinkling quaintness, like a boardwalk calliope, and haunting images of the sea as both a liberator and captor of souls."

Anyone may now propose books for next year by providing genre, title, author, country of origin, translator, publication and translation dates, publisher, page count, a short description, and format and availability information (print, eBook, audiobook; libraries, bookstores, online, etc.). The deadline for submitting nominations is September 8.

Books for September 21, October 19, and November 16 are *Out Stealing Horses* by Per Petterson (NO, 2003, 258 pages; translated 2005 by Anne Born); *The Old Man and His Sons* by Heðin Brú (Faroes, 1940, 166 pages; translated 1970 by John F. West); and *Animal Life* by Auður Ava Ólafsdóttir (IS, 2020, 192 pages; translated 2022 by Brian FitzGibbon).

## BOUND FOR A DISTANT SHORE HERITAGE GALLERY ART EXHIBITION

May to October 2025

The DAC was thrilled to receive a very special work of art from member Ruth Palm and the Palm family. The "Amy of Copenhagen," a brigantine, or two masted sailing ship model, serves as the centerpiece of a new exhibition featuring ships from the collection of the DAC, now on view in the Heritage Gallery. This intricately detailed ship was carved with a doctor's scalpel by Ruth's grandfather, Captain Frederik Ernst Funder (1857-1910). Beginning in 1885, Captain Funder carved the model during his free time while serving on a sailing ship. Life as a captain took Captain Funder all over the world, and in Lebanon he conceived the idea and procured a limb of a tree to begin carving the model ship. Named after his daughter Amy who was born in 1881, the model saw completion in 1888. The rigging is made of home spun linen.



The "Amy of Copenhagen" is accompanied by paintings and decorative arts that show how important the sea and ships are to Danish culture. From Viking ships to fishing, from contemporary recreational sailing vessels to container ships for world trade, the sea is central to Danish culture and identity. Denmark's geographic position gives it control of the Danish straits (Skagerrak and Kattegat), linking the Baltic and North Seas.

The 19th century painting "Danish Ship off the Coast of Helsingør" illustrates how this geography gave Denmark historical international stature. Another favorite work of art in the collection is the Tin Advertising Sign for Thingvalla, Scandinavian Lines of the Ocean Liner Fredrik VIII. This steamer, built in 1913, ferried many Scandinavian immigrants to the US. Our exhibit will remain on view through October, so visit the next time you are at DAC.

## ADVANCED DANISH DISCUSSION AND CULTURE CLASS

Wednesdays, May 14 and 28 from 1:30-3 pm

Each session: \$10 DAC members, \$15 non-members

Come join a group of advanced language and culture learners for a discussion based on Danish author, Susanne V. Knudsen's book, *Grandmother's Universe* (*Farmors verden*). This class is for people with a solid Danish language foundation, who are interested in expanding their knowledge of the language, while diving into the challenging and harsh life of rural Denmark from 1880 to 1940. The class will move slowly through the chapters following student language levels.

Danish-born instructor Niels Billund has been teaching, tutoring and playing music for a number of years in the Twin Cities, including a stint at Skovsøen. He is currently translating *Grandmother's Universe* to English.
